## Seasons of change

Having completed over ten years of service on the Menno-Hof Board, I've had the advantage of watching this vital institution move through many seasons of change. As president of the board for the past five years, that perspective has been more intimate than I ever would have imagined. I have been and continue to be inspired by the founding vision of Menno-Hof: to share God's story, through the Mennonite and Amish experience, with our churches and those visiting our community.

Over the years, I've witnessed God's consistent faithfulness to Menno-Hof, regardless of the challenges or opportunities it has faced. The foundational leadership of Tim Lichti in the beginning years of Menno-Hof was followed by interim leadership from Oliver Yutzzy and briefly by current Executive Director Jerry Beasley. In 2001 Joseph Yoder brought his passion to Menno-Hof's leadership role helping move us into a new phase of program growth and deepening relations with constituents. LeRoy Mast served as director for one year from 2008-2009. God's hand was clearly at work in Joseph's availability to return as interim executive director in the fall of 2009 and in the selection and arrival of Jerry Beasley as current executive director in September 2010. Today Menno-Hof is exceptionally well equipped and staffed by a dedicated team. Add to this list a host of long-term and daily volunteers from throughout our community and across the continent and we can see that Menno-Hof is truly blessed.

These years have also seen the Menno-Hof Board expand, adding new skills and perspectives—including representatives of the Amish faith for the first time. God has consistently worked through this group to provide energy, wisdom and vision, particularly during the challenging economic times of 2007-2009.

As visitor trends change in the Shippshewana community and the region, so must Menno-Hof. Today, regular traffic in our facility stands at less than half of what it was during our opening year in 1988. Bus tours may some day be a thing of the past. Funding for school field trips is increasingly restricted.

November 23, 2010, a small group of excited school children and teachers from the Old Brethren Christian School in Wakarusa, Ind., came through the doors of Menno-Hof, not sure what to expect during their tour.

We asked Trent what his other favorites were at Menno-Hof and he said "laying on the bunk beds in the ship while listening to Anna's Story—and the tornado room."



- 1,458** students—all the way from elementary to college age—visited Menno-Hof in 2010.

- 847,969** visitors to-date (since 1988 when Menno-Hof opened)
- 40** religions were represented by visitors in 2010 including Eastern Orthodox, Jehovah's Witness, Hindu, Pagan, Buddhist, Quaker and Atheist.




## DIRECTOR'S DESK
